MAIN STREET PROJECT

Next week, installation of the snowmelt system in front of the Love and Smile buildings will continue, as well as continued installation of light poles and the laying of brick and granite tiles. Cement sidewalks will be poured in front of Constantly Pizza, Abbott Bennett, and the Love building; and in the area south of Theatre Street in front of Willows and Spank Alley.

A Severino Construction crew will begin preparing for later repaving the portion of South Main Street between Storrs Street and Theatre Street to match the newly reconstructed section of South Main Street to its north. Two-way traffic will be maintained, but one lane at a time will be closed in this four-lane section of South Main Street for the crew to work. Traffic will be shifted into the other lane and no delays are expected.

HIGH SCHOOL FIRE SCIENCE PROGRAM CERTIFICATES

The Concord Regional Technical Center at Concord High School recently awarded certificates of completion to 14 seniors who completed the Fire Science Program, including 12 men and two women. Those students are now eligible to take the Firefighter I written and practical exams at the NH Fire Academy. The Concord Fire Department is a principal partner with the school, and Acting Captain Derek Martel and Lieutenant David Dumas (pictured) served as course coordinators this year. Several other members of the Concord Fire Department served as adjunct faculty. The students are also eligible for six hours of college credit at Lakes Region Community College.
