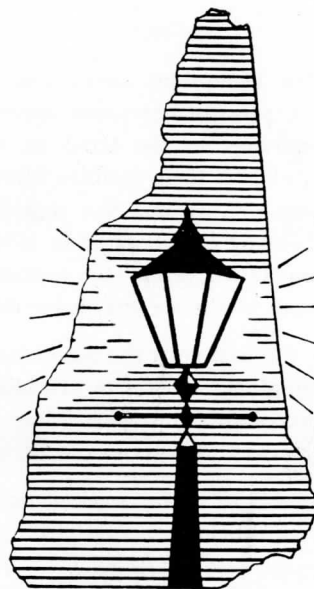

It was first organized in 1912 and legally incorporated in 1933. The Association is supported by contributions and bequests which are tax deductible.
